1) 1436-77: Soft tissue paravertebral nodule in a 45 y.o. male.

Diagnosis: Nodular fasciitis.

2) 78-10634: Open lung biopsy in a 42 y.o. female with SOB

Diagnosis: Secondary mammary duct carcinoma

3) 6212-67: Large pulmonary tumour in a 60 y.o. male.

Diagnosis: Fibrous mesothelioma.

4) P.M.#78-039: 50 y.o. female with renal failure

Diagnosis: Lupus erythematosus-associated lymphadenopathy.

5) P.M.#78-151: 68 y.o. female who died suddenly while watering plants.

Diagnosis: Floppy mitral valve syndrome.

6) A74-103R: 11 day old female with severe hydrocephalus, ambiguous external genitalia, failure to thrive, serum N_2 , serum K.

Diagnosis: 21 hydroxylase deficiency with congenital adrenocortical hyperplasia (Adrenogenital syndrome).

7) 79-220: Elderly male with hepatic failure 10 days following cataract removal.

Diagnosis: Halothane-associated hepatitis.

8 79-734-2: 61 year old female with neck swelling of 5 months duration.

Diagnosis: Poorly differentiated lymphocytic lymphoma with immunoblastic differentiation in Hashimoto's thyroiditis.

9 1) 78-22618-4: 25 year old male with bleeding nasal turbinate mass.

Diagnosis: "Juvenile" angiofibroma (note: Because of the controversial diagnosis, further expert opinions will be solicited.)

10 2) 78-20516: 35 y.o. male with idiopathic chronic ulcerative colitis for 15 years, and who now has an 8.0 x 6.0 x 5.0 cm. caecal mass with small distal mucosal nodules.

Diagnosis: Malignant carcinoid tumor (confirmed by EM). (To be submitted to CANCER for publication).

11 *Worked* #11 UH77-5114C: Renal mass in a 67 y.o. male

Diagnosis: Sarcomatoid renal cell carcinoma.

12 1) 78-24291: 19 year old male with a right infraorbital "sebaceous cyst"

Diagnosis: Chondroid syringoma (mixed tumor).

13 2) 78-18455: Perianal polyp in a 59 year old male.

Diagnosis: Superficially invasive well differentiated squamous cell carcinoma.

14 S78-8770: Well-demarcated subcutaneous elbow mass in a 3 month old male.

Diagnosis: Lipoblastoma.

15 1) 10619-78: 20 year old female with massive intraperitoneal bleeding. Splenectomy for a laceration showed a 6.0 cm. in diameter hemorrhagic nodule.

Diagnosis: Metastatic gestational choriocarcinoma.

- 16 2) 78-384: Sudden death in a 60 y.o. male farmer. Autopsy showed cardiomegaly, and marked stenosis of the left anterior descending coronary artery with anterior wall left ventricular fibrosis. Sections from a 120 Gm. spleen.

Diagnosis: Exsanguinated spleen (patient died after traumatic leg amputation).

- 17 9247₂-78: 13.0 cm. in diameter pelvic mass in a 67 year old diabetic female with an abdominal-perineal resection of the rectum. Endometrial curettings six months earlier were negative.

Diagnosis: Epithelioid leiomyosarcoma, probably arising from lower segment myometrium (confirmed by EM).
